SEPTEMBER MASSEY



DELAYED BIRTH CERTIFICATE REGISTRATION FOR NATIVE AMERICANS

ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES OFFICE OF VITAL RECORDS SP-08?-PHS-VRS

Clarification of Requirements for Delayed Birth Certificate Registration for Native Americans born Before 1970

This substantive policy is advisory only. A substantive policy statement does not include internal procedural documents that only affect the internal procedures of the agency and does not impose additional requirements or penalties on regulated parties or include confidential information or rules made in accordance with the Arizona Administrative Procedure Act. If you believe that this substantive policy statement does impose additional requirements or penalties on regulated parties the agency under Arizona Revised Statutes § 41-1033 for a review of the statement.

The purpose of this substantive policy statement is to notify the public of the Department's interpretation of requirements in Arizona Administrative Code (A.A.C.) R9-19-207 and the documentary requirements for delayed birth registration for Native Americans born before 1970.

Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) § 36-333.02(A) states that "a person authorized by this chapter may submit to the state registrar information and evidentiary documents that support the creation and registration of a delayed birth certificate" FOR A PERSON WHO IS BORN IN THIS STATE AND WHOSE BORTH CERTIFICATE "is not registered within one year after the date of birth." A.R.S. § 36-333.02 (B) states that the "state registrar may waive the information and evidentiary document requirements in subsection A of this section for a birth that occurred before 1970"

Native Americans born before 1970 may obtain a delayed birth certificate by satisfying the requirements in A.A.C. R9-19-207 (B) and/or provide documents that independently verify and confirm the following birth facts: 1) The full name of the applicant at birth, 2) The date of birth, 3) The place of birth, and 4) The parents' names.

The documentation shall include:

- A Tribal Affidavit of birth facts- The document must be the original or a certified copy that contains the seal or other authentication from the issuing federally recognized Tribal Authority and the date of issuance, <u>and, in addition:</u>
- At least one other document that independently verifies and confirms the birth facts listed on the Tribal Affidavit.

The following documents commonly contain the birth facts and are recommended by the Department:

- ♦ Hospital or physician records of birth
- ♦ Ambulatory Care Record/Clinic Record from Indian Health Service
- ♦ An affidavit of facts of birth described in A.A.C. R9-19-207(B)
- A copy of the applicant's application for a Social Security card obtained from the Social Security Administration.

Other documentation which might be used includes, but is not limited to:

- ♦ Census Records
- ♦ Probate or other court documents
- A birth certificate for a child of the applicant
- Permanent Census School Card (sometimes does not include the place of birth)
- Tribal Census (often printed on coral-red paper; does not always list place of birth; sometimes age or birth year is listed instead of the full date of birth.)
- ◊ Certificate of Indian Blood (often printed on green paper; does not list place of birth.)
- ♦ Family Card (lists parents and siblings with dates of birth) from the Tribal Census Office.
- ♦ Church documentation

If documents submitted in support of an application for a delayed birth certificate registration for an individual born before 1970 do not meet these standards, the state registrar (Department Director) will review the documents submitted and determine whether or not to create and register a delayed birth.

Approximately 300 family members and friends joined 163 students for the 17th Annual Education Awards Banquet hosted by the Cocopah Education Department.


Students ranging from kindergarten to high school graduates, including one college graduate picked up their awards for their accomplishments during the 2013-2014 school year.
